

The Joan Sherman Program for Resilient Children is helping children who have been abused or neglected to gain skills that can help them overcome the long-term effects of the trauma in their lives.



Thanks to the support of foundations, businesses, individuals, the Department of Child Services, the United Way and community volunteers, SCAN continues to protect and invest in our most valuable resource: our children.

Our Accomplishments

As SCAN closed out its 2012 fiscal year, a year in which the agency experienced new cuts in state funding, new and tragic incidents of child abuse and neglect occurred. Such reports compel us to remain mission driven and to stay the course. With the support of the community, we are preparing parents and protecting children.

We are making a difference in the lives of little ones and their families:

- For 19 years, SCAN's Healthy Families program has helped prevent abuse and neglect. Long range surveys show 95% of families are abuse free.
- SCAN's Daybreak program experienced a 116% increase in the number of bed days provided to children in need. On average, families use the Daybreak program for 4 days. In 2012, 116 children spent a combined 873 days with specially licensed foster providers.
- SCAN has been entrusted to select and monitor the distribution of nearly \$1.4 million to not-for-profits in northeast Indiana who offer programs that align with SCAN's mission to eliminate child abuse.
- Through SCAN's Read-To-Me program, 3,844 books were provided to families with young children, giving moms and dads the opportunity to form a bond achieved through routines, such as reading together.
- SCAN staff is helping children going through the pain of divorce by providing support and education to their families. We are helping parents manage their hurt and anger in a manner that does not harm their child.
- SCAN continues to manage the Dr. Bill Lewis Center for Children where trained professionals interview suspected victims of sexual abuse. In 2012, more than 650 children were interviewed by the Center.



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SCAN's services are available to all individuals regardless of race, color, gender, sexual orientation, religious beliefs, national origin, veteran status, age and/or mental or physical disability. SCAN is nonsectarian and partially funded by the Indiana Department of Child Services. SCAN is an equal-opportunity, affirmative-action employer and a 501(c)(3) organization.

Our Economic Impact

In addition to providing programs and services to help protect children and restore families, SCAN benefits the community through employment of 142 women and men who own homes, shop, volunteer, attend community events and send their children to school in our region. SCAN also makes a concerted effort to purchase supplies from local vendors and seeks out businesses that are registered with the Indiana Minority and Women's Business Enterprises Division.

The Be SomeOne Now program is connecting young adults, age 16-21, to necessary resources to obtain their GED. As a result of this program, young adults are developing their skill sets and finding success in life.

Our Region

SCAN offers services to 19 counties in Indiana, including: Elkhart, Kosciusko, Marshall, St. Joseph (Region 3), Cass, Fulton, Howard, Miami, Wabash (Region 6), Adams, Allen, DeKalb, Grant, Huntington, LaGrange, Noble, Steuben, Wells and Whitley. SCAN has offices in Fort Wayne, Logansport, Wabash and Warsaw.




Fiscal Year 2012


Financial Information
